President's Message

Well, 2020 is about over. What a year for the history books. As one friend exclaimed, there are not enough words to describe this year. It has been one of challenges, losses and many trials. However, we can also say that there were lessons learned. How many of us had heard of Zoom, let alone how to use it. I can say that I am not only familiar with Zoom but also Webex, Microsoft Teams and other ways to link.

David Patrick, Stephan Porter and I coordinated with Workforce Solutions Alamo (WSA), the Texas Workforce Commission and its various partners to create a virtual Red White and You Hiring Fair on November 5th. Of the total 925 job seekers attending, 388 identified themselves as veterans. As for employers, there were 131. The Alamo Chapter coordinated the Veterans Resource Village for the event. Sixteen nonprofits featuring education

and other transition resources connected with these job fair participants. What an experience. Check out the photo of the WSA Command Center below. That's me in the middle of the room, assisting as needed with any technical difficulties. Yes, masked and socially distanced.

The Chapter is moving forward with plans for 2021. There is a great list of speakers for the monthly "meetings". We're planning on Zooms for at least the first few months of the year. Peter Hunt and the scholarship committee are already working on the scholarship program for Spring 2021. We have other opportunities in the works.

The reality is that the pandemic has impacted our chapter finances. This will continue to be a challenge. You have received letters from me requesting your assistance for both the Operations fund and the Education Foundation. As we analyzed the membership stats, we found that only 45% of our members are actually dues paying. We continue to ensure quality programs and opportunities for you for only \$20 per year. The Chapter Operations needs your financial support. Our expenses are bare minimum. Even with this frugality, it has not been able to match the income.

Please support us when you receive the membership renewal reminders. Donations and sponsorships are also welcome.

The next meeting of the MOAA Scholarship Committee will take place (virtually, of course) on Friday, 11 Dec 20, at 10am via the Zoom link below:







This beautiful medal celebrates the 90th anniversary of the founding of Randolph Field, often called "The West Point of the Air" by the air cadets who trained there early in its history. The base, known for most of its history as Randolph Air Force Base, is now called JBSA-Randolph.

The medal features the famous "Taj Mahal" superimposed over the Alamo. The Taj Mahal was designed as a multi-purpose building that serves as base headquarters, theater, administrative offices, and a water tower. It is the focus of the "air city" imagined by the founders of Randolph. The medal has an Air Force blue drape and a dangle with the Air Force logo. The numerals on either side of the Taj Mahal celebrate the founding date of 1930 and the anniversary date of 2020. The medal was designed and produced by Celebrate Excellence of San Antonio under the direction of retired Air Force Colonel Karen Currie who was assigned to Randolph Air Force Base during the 50th anniversary celebrations in 1980.

Col Currie, a member of the MOAA Alamo Chapter, is donating a medal to each contributor of \$100 or more to the MOAA-AC Educational Foundation Scholarship Fund between now and February 28, 2020. This is sure to be a treasured keepsake for any Air Force member who has spent some duty time in the shadow of the Taj Mahal. "Randolph @90" would be perfect stocking stuffer for Fiesta Medal collectors.

Learn more about the history and significance of JBSA-Randolph from the historian of the 12th Flying Training Wing, Mr. Lane Bourgeois, during the MOAA-AC monthly ZOOM webinar on Thursday December 17 from 1100-1200. Mr. Bourgeois will be making a special presentation on the resiliency of Randolph's founders, who had to overcome a multitude of problems to make Randolph Field a reality. He will also discuss the Father of Randolph, General Frank Lahm; the Architect of Randolph, Lt (later General) Harold Clark; the namesake, Capt. William Randolph; and the herculean contributions of the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce.

Ladder Safety

Whether you are dusting above the cabinets, cleaning gutters or putting up Christmas lights, a ladder may be just the tool you need!

- Guard doorways and block any high traffic areas to reduce the chance of collision. Be mindful of weather conditions that may make outdoor ladder use hazardous, such as rain or high winds.
- Set a strong foundation. Set the ladder on firm, flat or even surface. If you must use a ladder on a soft surface try placing a board beneath.
- Angle it appropriately. A straight or extension ladder should be placed a foot away from the surface it is resting against for every four feet of the ladder's height.
- Climb carefully. Face the ladder when climbing and maintain three points of contact --- either two hands and a foot or two feet and a hand. Grip the rungs not the side rails and don't climb with items in your hands. Wear shoes with good traction.
- Stop before the top. Don't stand on the top of the step ladder. With straight or extension ladders, avoid going higher than the third rung from the top.
- Avoid leaning or over reaching. Get down and reposition the ladder instead.
- Ask for help. If you are not feeling steady request help to complete the task. Or hire someone to get the job done.

Your COVID-19 Risk

The more risk factors, the higher your chance of exposure.

Your local gym, the take-out joint, the gas station or grocery store, your doctor's office, your grandchild's playground: among the public areas you visit most, which ones pose the biggest risks for exposure to COVID-19?

Considering the following five risk factors.

1. Poor air flow

People infected with COVID release viral particles into the air when they talk, cough, or sneeze. The viral particles ride in bits of moisture of varying sizes. Droplets, which are larger, tend to sink to the ground within six feet of the person who expels them. Tiny aerosols, however, can float or drift in the air for hours. Someone else who inhales the viral particles can get infected.

Air transmission is critically important. One of the biggest risks for getting COVID-19 is spending time indoors in environments with low ventilation — no open windows to dilute the indoor air contaminants, and no air purifiers to clean the air.

If you're visiting an indoor location — like a gym or store — consider the ventilation. If the air is stuffy and windows are closed, it raises potential COVID transmission risk.

Outdoor areas generally have lower COVID risks, since air currents scatter and dilute the virus. This is a plus for outdoor places you visit (such as a gas station, playground, or sidewalk café).

2. Crowds

You can encounter crowds in outdoor venues (such as parks or busy sidewalks) or indoor spaces. The ventilation will be better outside, which is good; but the more people you're around (outdoors or indoors), the more likely you'll be in close proximity to potential COVID carriers and viral particles they release.

The advice is to limit or avoid travel to places where there are crowds. If you can't, try to stay at least six feet away from others to help reduce the number of droplets you're in contact with (but remember that smaller aerosols may still be present).

3. A lack of face mask usage

Wearing a face mask not only helps keep an infected person's COVID particles from being expelled, but also protects uninfected people from inhaling viral particles.

The World Health Organization now recommends that you wear a three-layer mask with an inner layer made of polypropylene fabric (nonwoven material used for such products as reusable shopping totes). If you don't see people wearing face masks where you're going, then leave.

You don't need to wear a mask while alone in a park, but keep a mask handy in case others come along.

4. How long you'll be there

The amount of time you spend somewhere, especially indoors, affects your risk for being exposed to COVID. The CDC notes that you can become infected by being within six feet of an infected person for 15 minutes or more.

Reduce your risk by getting in and out of indoor locations as quickly as possible. (Reduce it further by controlling additional factors — staying six feet away from others and wearing a mask.)

For example, when you need to go grocery shopping, make a list of everything you need in advance. If you're familiar with the store layout, tailor the list so you can move through the aisles efficiently, without needing to walk back and forth repeatedly.

If you have an appointment or you're picking up takeout food from a favorite restaurant, ask if you can wait outside and have them call or text you when it's time for your meeting or your

order is ready.

5. Contaminated surfaces

While it's not a common means of transmission, you can contract COVID by touching contaminated surfaces, such as a door handle. But it would have to be the case that a person just before you was infected and coughed on the handle; and you came along and touched it, didn't wash your hands, and then touched your eyes, nose, or mouth.

It's easy to break the potential chain of transmission. Just avoid touching your face, and use hand sanitizer frequently (as soon as you're finished shopping or pumping gas, for example).

The big picture

Consider all of the risk factors together to gauge COVID risk. The more risk factors present, the higher the risk. For example, spending an hour in a crowded, stuffy gym with low face mask use is a bad idea; instead, go for a walk and lift dumbbells at home.

We all need to keep going places — to the grocery store and pharmacy - Go out just when it's necessary, and follow precautions.
